Special Announcement by W. Bro. Geoffrey Abraham on his retirement as Chairman of the Association of Atholl Lodges

My Atholl Years.

I was elected Chairman of the Association of Atholl Lodges in the autumn of 1999 so, as you might imagine, the past 20 years have been quite a ride!

The Association can trace its origins back to a meeting in 1990 organised by W. Bro. Walter (Wally) Hall, the then Secretary of the Lodge of Prudent Brethren NO 145. Whilst researching the history of his own lodge Wally had become interested in the history of the Atholl Lodges in general, and he attempted to create a feeling for an Atholl! 'family' by inviting all Atholl Lodges to send representatives. The meeting was well attended, and the brethren supported the idea of the establishment of an Association to support communication with, and between, the Atholl Lodges. In 1995 Wally called a second meeting setting out the structure of the Association he was establishing, staffed by members of the Prudent Brethren Lodge, and in the next few years this was enhanced significantly by the appointment of V. W. Bro Walter Crombie as President and R. W. Bro the Most Hon. The Marquess of Northampton as the Grand Patron.



My first major role as Chairman was to organise the 'launch' of this new Association in the form of an Inaugural Open Meeting in March 2000 held at Freemasons Hall. The main Address was given by Lord Northampton who stressed the importance of the Atholl Grand Lodge and its Craft Lodges in the overall history of freemasonry. Walter Crombie dedicated the new Association Banner which had been presented to the Association by W. Bro. Fred Wilton and I gave details of some future events we had planned.

The first major social event held by the new Association of Atholl Lodges was the Millennium Reception held on HMS Belfast in July 2000. It was hosted by our Grand Paton, Lord Northampton and his lady, and included an inspection of Atholl related artefacts laid out on the Lower decks plus a Reception and Buffet Supper on the Upper deck along with our own, specially bottled, Atholl wine!

The success of this event, and of other social events held during this period, impressed upon me the importance of involving our Ladies in the activities of the Association. it has become the tradition to invite our Ladies to accompany us on visits, both at home and abroad. Usually our Ladies meet up with those from the Host Lodge and go out to dinner together, sometimes returning to join us after completion of the Festive Board. On two occasions, once in the USA and once in Gibraltar, the local lodges held a full scale Ladies Night to ensure our Ladies were properly entertained!

Another tradition developed over the years has been the appointment of successive A.G.M.s as our Grand Patrons. As I have premised Lord Northampton initiated this arrangement and he was succeeded, firstly by the R. W.Bro. David Williamson and, more recently, by the R. W. Bro. Sir David Wootton. Our original President, the V. W.Bro. Walter Crombie was succeeded by the R. W.Bro. Russell Race who has given many years of service. I am hugely indebted to all these Senior Grand Officers who, when requested, have provided me with sound advice and have attended many of our major events, often giving Addresses on a range of topics. They have all enhanced significantly many of the Association's most important occasions.

However, on a day to day basis, the really hard work of running the Association, liaising with all the Atholl Lodges and organising visits, has fallen on the Officers. The Association is very indebted to the original group of Officers from the Prudent Brethren Lodge who set up and sustained it during the early days. However, in order to develop a National Association, it was necessary to broaden the officer base to encompass a wider range of lodges and this process continues. I have enjoyed hugely Chairing such friendly and well-informed groups and I thank all of them, most sincerely, for their hard work as well as their excellent company.

You will gather from the above remarks that I have derived great pleasure from acting as Chairman over some 20 years. The Atholl Lodges provide some wonderful personalities plus fascinating insights into aspects of masonic history. I am sure the Association will continue to flourish into the future, we have many talented and experienced people on board, and I wish them well.


Over that period he has attended many events far and wide and has it has always been a delight to find his wife June accompanying him making sure he is properly turned out in his best regalia!!




A VISIT TO THE PYTHAGOREAN LODGE No.79

In January this year I had the pleasure to represent the Association at a meeting of the Pythagorean Lodge No.79. One of the last Antients lodges to be warranted they received their warrant in March 1813; originally they met at the Mitre Tavern in Greenwich, but after relocating several times they now meet at Freemasons' Hall in Great Queen Street.

They became known as the Pythagorean Lodge in 1828. Geometry has always been fundamental to Freemasonry; and we use Pythagoras's famous right angled triangle theorem to figuratively represent geometry as a whole. In the 18th century William Preston wrote that 'geometry, the first and noblest of sciences, is the basis on which the superstructure of Masonry is erected'; Euclid's proof of Pythagoras's theorem was on the frontispiece of our first

Being their Installation meeting it was a very busy evening; but the Worshipful Master and Brethren made me most welcome. I was also given the opportunity to say a few words about the Atholl legacy, and our Association. On the occasion of the lodge's bi-centenary in 2013 the Association presented an Atholl Gavel to their Master, it is still in use; so on this occasion I presented them with a second gavel for their Senior Warden's use, together with a copy of the Association's latest publication '*The Atholl Legacy*'. Incidentally our present supply of presentation gavels were kindly made for us by a member of the Pythagorean Lodge.

Antient Times.....

THE LONGEST EVER 'CALLING OFF'? - Founded in 1767 the Lodge of St. John No.115 still meets in Gibraltar;



originally a military lodge its early members were mostly artillery men. The lodge was meeting when the Great Siege of Gibraltar started in 1779, but they immediately 'Called Off' to go and man their guns; they did not 'Call On' again until 1783!

THE TROWEL - The trowel has had a long and varied history in Freemasonry. The 18th century rituals used it to symbolise peace and benevolence; but in the early 19th century the trowel largely disappeared from our ritual, although some lodges did still use it as an extra working tool. Our Royal Arch chapters also have a trowel amongst the implements they display, and the ritual tells us how companions once worked with a trowel in their right hand and a sword ready by their left hand.

In the 1970s the trowel returned to our lodges as the Charity Steward's jewel; but historically Past Masters, Entered Apprentices, Inner Guards and Tylers have all worn it as a jewel. The first Inner Guards may have been armed with pointed trowels, not poignards; this office was at one time given to the junior Entered Apprentice, so at their Initiations monarchs were said to be exchanging 'the sceptre for the trowel'.


